Elizabeth Garrett Anderson (9 June 1818 – 17 December 1905) was an English physician and suffragist. She was the first woman to qualify in Britain as a doctor. However, meetings with the feminist Emily Davies and Elizabeth Blackwell, the first American woman physician, convinced Elizabeth Garrett that she should. Elizabeth Garrett Anderson was the first female doctor to qualify in England. She opened a school of medicine for women, and paved the way for women's education. Elizabeth Garrett Anderson, (born June 9, 1818, Aldeburgh, Suffolk, Eng., died Dec. 17, 1905, Aldeburgh), English physician who advocated women's rights. Elizabeth Garrett Anderson was a pioneering feminist born in Whitechapel, London, in England. Today would have been her 187th birthday, and Elizabeth Garrett Anderson (1818–1905) was the first Englishwoman to qualify as a doctor. She overcame stiff opposition to gain her medical education. Elizabeth was born in Whitechapel where her father, Newson Garrett, was a pawnbroker. Her parents returned to the family's home town of Aldeburgh. Elizabeth Garrett was born in Whitechapel, London. She was initially educated at home but at 13 sent to boarding school. She was always interested in politics. Dr Elizabeth Garrett Anderson was buried in Aldeburgh on December 21, 1905. She was the first woman in Britain to qualify as a doctor, the first woman Dean of a Medical School, the first woman member of the Royal Society, and the first woman to qualify as a doctor in Britain.
